## HISTORICAL BACKGROUND:

The dogs of today are from the United States, but are associated with the Basque Shepherds from Basque Region of the Pyrenees Mountains between Spain and France. The Basque Shepherds emigrated from Australia in the 1800's, thereby; the Australian Shepherds acquired their name. They were used on ranches for working livestock.

## BREED APPEARANCE:

The Australian Shepherd is a medium sized dog; height is 18 to 23 inches and weighs from 35 – 70 pounds. Its coat is medium length, silky texture with a soft undercoat. Its ears are a medium triangular size, set high on the head, which at attention break forward and to the side. Its coat is white on muzzle, mane, underbelly, & feet with the remainder marbled red, grey, tan, and or black. It has a docked or bobbed tail.

**WHY YOU WOULD LOVE THIS BREED:** Australian Shepherds are extremely smart, easy to train, loyal, hard working, have a great sense of humor and are great for herding or guarding. They also excel in agility competition and obedience.

**WHY YOU WOULD NOT LOVE THIS BREED:** This breed tends to bark at everything, is hyperactive, and should be handled by experienced dog owners. This breed needs training and a job to perform. If untrained and jobless, this dog can become aggressive towards other dogs and people, especially strangers.

## DO THEY SHED?



Yes, they shed moderately and should be brushed at least twice a week. Their coat sheds twice a year.

## WILL THIS BREED BITE MY CHILD?



This breed loves children but tend to 'nip at the heels' of running children and due to their heritage, may even try herding them! EXTREME CAUTION AND SUPERVISION IS ALWAYS RECOMMENDED WHEN CHILDREN AND DOGS ARE TOGETHER!

## WOULD THEY KILL OTHER ANIMALS?



Generally good with animals they are raised with, but training is essential to maintain control.

They are very energetic so you need to take an active roll in exercising and have adequate (secured) room for them to run.

## WHAT ARE THE HEALTH CONCERNS?



Health concerns include: Idiopathic Epilepsy, which is believed to be an inheritable disease, and Hip Dysplasia. Buying from a reputable breeder is always advisable and will help to lessen the chances for health problems and congenital defects.
